4. First-aid measures

Description of first aid measures

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Indication of immediate medical attention and special treatment needed

Maintain adequate ventilation and oxygenation of the patient. Butanol has been reported to cause eye effects (tearing, blurred vision, sensitivity to light, temporary comeal effects), hearing loss and vertigo. No specific antidote. Treatment of exposure should be directed at the control of symptoms and the clinical condition of the patient.

5. Fire Fighting Measures

Suitable extinguishing media

Water fog or fine spray. Dry chemical fire extinguishers. Carbon dioxide fire extinguishers. Foam. Alcohol resistant foams (ATC type) are preferred. Advice for firefighters

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7. Handling and Storage

Handling
